The Israelites Become Slaves Exodus 1

(Read chapter 1 for a background knowledge).

After Joseph and his brothers died, the family continued to grow. The pharaoh who knew and loved Joseph died. Other kings came to Egypt and in time they died. As the years passed, the Israelites, or Hebrews, as they were sometimes called, became a great nation. Four hundred years went by. The pharaoh at that time didn't care what Joseph had done. He didn't even remember that Joseph had saved Egypt from a great famine. This king was afraid of the Israelites, the people from Jacob's family.

"There are too many of them!" the pharaoh told his officers. "What if we have a war? They might fight on the other side with our enemy. We must do something now!" So this king made the Israelites become his slaves. He put cruel slave drivers in charge of them. He made them build cities for him. The Israelites worked harder and harder. But they kept having more children.

Pharaoh had another plan. He told the women who delivered the Israelite babies that they were not to let the baby boys live. But these women wanted to honor God, so they didn't do it. Meanwhile, the Israelite community kept getting bigger and bigger.

Pharaoh called for the women who delivered babies. "Why aren't you doing what I commanded?" he asked these midwives.

"We try," the women said. "But the Israelite women give birth to their babies faster than Egyptian women. So we don't get there in time." God was pleased with these midwives and blessed them.

Then Pharaoh gave another command to his people. "Throw the Israelite baby boys into the Nile River," he ordered. He said that only the girls could live. It was a terrible rule.

Let's Review:

Moses is Born Exodus 2: 1-10

Pharaoh was making life miserable for the Israelites. But no matter how miserable life was, the Israelites got married and had children. A man and woman from the tribe of Levi got married and began to have a family. In time a baby boy was born. Pharaoh had commanded that all Israelite baby boys should be thrown into the Nile River. But the Egyptians missed this baby boy. For three months the mother hid him in their home.

The baby's mother was worried. How could she keep hiding this little boy? Surely some soldiers would find him. Then they would throw him into the Nile River. She must do something.

So, one day the mother made a little basket from the grass that grew by the river. She covered it with tar so it would float. Then she hid it among the tall blades of grass along the side of the Nile River. The baby's older sister, Miriam, hid nearby to watch.

That day a princess, a daughter of the cruel Pharaoh, came down to bath at the river. The princess saw the little boat and told a helper to bring it to her. When she opened the basket, there was a baby boy. He was crying. Her heart was touched. "This is one of the Hebrews' children," she said.

Miriam ran to the princess. Shall I go and call a nurse for you from the Hebrew women, that she may nurse the child for you? "she asked.

"Yes," said the princess. So Miriam rushed home for her mother.

""Take this child away and nurse him for me, " said the princess. "I will give you your wages." So, the baby's mother took him home. She was paid to take care of her own baby!

When the baby was older, his mother brought him to the princess. The princess claimed him as her own son. She named the boy Moses, which sounded like the Hebrew word that meant "to take out," for she had taken him out of the water.

Let's Review:



"An Egyptian helped us," they said.


Jethro said, "Go back and invite him here for supper." So they did.

The Burning Bush Exodus 2:23-4:20

The king who wanted to kill Moses died. Now there was a new pharaoh in Egypt. But Moses' people, the Israelites, were still suffering as slaves. They cried to the Lord, and he heard them. He remembered the promises He had made to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. He had promised to bring their family members back to Canaan someday. Now was the time.

Meanwhile, Moses was in Midian. He was taking care of Jethro's sheep one day near Horeb, the mountain of God. Suddenly the angel of the Lord appeared to him as a flame in a bush. The bush burned, but it never burned up! Moses had to go over to see what was happening.

Then God called to Moses from the burning bush. "Moses!" God said. Moses answered, "Here I am." "Don't come closer. Take off your sandals, for you are on holy ground. I am the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. I have heard the cries of your people in Egypt," God said. "I will take them to a land where plenty of food grows. 



Making bricks without straw Exodus 4:21 – 5:23

When Moses and Aaron arrived in Egypt, they first went to see the Israelite leaders. Then they went to Pharaoh. "We have a message from God," they said. "Let my people go into the wilderness. They must worship God there."

But God knew what He was doing. "Pharaoh will let your people go," He said.





The River that Turned to Blood Exodus 7:1-24

Moses and Aaron were having a lot of trouble. The Lord had commanded them to take His people from Egypt. But when Moses and Aaron talked to Pharaoh, he refused to let the Israelites go. He made the Israelite slaves work harder. Now the Israelites were too discouraged to listen to Moses and Aaron. So, the Lord told Moses and Aaron to go back to Pharaoh.

When Moses and Aaron went to see Pharaoh, he demanded a miracle. So Aaron threw down his shepherd's rod, and it became a snake. But Pharaoh brought in his magicians, and they did the same thing. 

Pharaoh Learns About God's Power Exodus 8

Moses and Aaron did not go back to Pharaoh for a week. Then God commanded them to see Pharaoh again. "Tell Pharaoh to let my people go or I will send millions of frogs," God said. "They will swarm over the whole land. They will come into the houses of the Egyptian people and even get into bed with them." The Lord also said to Moses, "Tell Aaron to point his shepherds rod toward all the waters of Egypt -- rivers, streams, pools. The frogs will come out of the waters and cover Egypt." So Aaron did. Pharaoh's magicians also caused frogs to come upon the land. The frogs were a terrible problem.

Pharaoh told Moses, "Beg God to take the frogs away. I will let your people go to worship."

"Tell me when you want them to go," said Moses. "Then I will pray, and the frogs will die at that time."

"Tomorrow!" said Pharaoh.

So Moses prayed the next day, and God caused the frogs to die. The land was covered with dead frogs. But Pharaoh hardened his heart and grew stubborn again. He went back on his word. He would not let the people go.

"Tell Aaron to strike the dust with his rod," God told Moses. "The dust will become tiny Lice. They will cover the land." Moses and Aaron obeyed. The bugs covered the whole land.

Pharaoh's magicians tried to do this, but they could not. "This is God's finger at work," the magicians told Pharaoh. But Pharaoh was as hard-hearted and stubborn as ever. He refused to listen. He would not let the Israelites go. Then the Lord told Moses, "Meet Pharaoh as he goes to wash in the river. Tell him to let my people go. If he will not, I will send swarms of flies all over the land. But there will be no flies in Goshen where the Israelites live. This will happen tomorrow."

"All right!" Pharaoh said. "Go! But stay in Egypt to worship your God. Don't leave the land."

"No," said Moses. "We must make a three-day trip into the wilderness."

"All right, go!" said Pharaoh. "Just take these flies away."

"I will pray and ask the Lord to take the flies away," said Moses. "But you must not lie to us again. You must not tell us we can go and change your mind."

So when Moses prayed, the Lord took the flies away. But then Pharaoh hardened his heart again. He refused to let the people go.



THE FIRST PASSOVER Exodus 9:1-26 12:26

Pharaoh had seen the waters of Egypt become blood. Then there were the plagues of frogs, tiny bugs, and flies. Each time it was clear that God was sending these plagues. But each time Pharaoh hardened his heart and stubbornly refused to let the Israelites go. Then the Lord sent a terrible plague upon the Egyptian cattle. And he sent boils upon the Egyptian people. There also was a violent hailstorm. At first Pharaoh said the Israelites could go but then he grew hard and stubborn again. Then the Lord sent a plague of locusts. They destroyed what the hailstorm had left. And there was a terrible plague of darkness. It was dark throughout Egypt for three days and in Goshen there was light.

Now there was one last plague to come. "About midnight the Lord will pass through Egypt," Moses told Pharaoh. "The oldest boy in every Egyptian family will die. But the Israelite families will be safe."

Then God gave orders to the Israelites through Moses. He told them to put the blood of a lamb around each door, on the sides and the top of the doorframe. He said each family was to eat the roast meat of that lamb. They were to eat with traveling clothes on, prepared for a long trip. This Passover feast was to be celebrated each year so that God's people would remember how he passed over their houses and kept their families safe.

The Israelites did what Moses told them. They were ready to leave Egypt. About midnight, throughout the land, the Egyptian families lost their oldest sons.

Pharaoh called for Moses and Aaron during the night. "Go! Leave us," he said. "Take your flocks and herds and be gone. But please give me a blessing as you go."

God told the Israelites to ask their Egyptian neighbors for clothes, silver and gold. The Egyptians wanted them to leave, so they gave the people of Israel everything they wanted. Now the Israelites were ready to leave Egypt. But then Pharaoh hardened his heart again. He refused to let the people go.

God didn't want His people to forget the Passover. So he made this day a holiday.

It was a special time when the people could rest, celebrate, feast, worship God,






THE EXODUS Exodus 12:37-51

The Israelite people had been slaves for a long, long time. Now suddenly that was coming to an end. The Passover was over. The Lord had passed over the Israelite homes, for they all had lamb's blood on their doorways. But the oldest son in every Egyptian family had died. Now the people of Egypt were urging the Israelites to leave. Even hard-hearted Pharaoh was urging them to leave. The Egyptians gave their Israelite neighbors expensive jewelry and clothes. The people of Egypt saw now that God was with his people. Because the plagues had almost destroyed Egypt, the people wanted the Israelites to leave their land.

So the Exodus from Egypt began on the night of the Passover. What a sight it was! There were 600,000 men, as well as the women and children. There were thousands of animals -- cattle, sheep, and goats. The Israelites had been in Egypt 430 years.

This became a very special night for the Israelites. They had seen the plagues hurt the land of Egypt. But the plagues had not come to Goshen, where the Israelites lived. God had kept them safe. It was clear that God had prepared the Israelites to leave. They were slaves no longer. They were free! God would make a great nation of them.


But the Israelites must have wondered many things as they made their way out of Egypt. Where were they going? How would they know where to go? Where would they get food? Where would they get water in the wilderness? God knew the answers. The people did not. Sometimes it is good that we don't know what will happen next. We can trust God the same way the Israelites did.

Let's Review:

How long had the Israelites been in Egypt? How many Israelite men were in the Exodus? Moses was leading the Israelite people -- who was leading Moses? Great leaders like Moses are led by God. To be a great leader, Moses had to be a good follower. He had to follow and obey God's commands.

A PILLAR OF CLOUD AND FIRE Exodus 13:17-22

Now the Israelites were free. God was going to lead them into the land where Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob had lived. It was the land God had promised to them. So it is often called the Promised Land.

But how would the Israelites know where to go? It had been 430 years since their ancestors came to Egypt. They knew that Moses would lead them. But who would lead Moses? Who would show him where to go?

The most direct way to the Promised Land was through the land of the Philistines. But the Israelites were not ready to fight a war. They had been slaves. They were not yet warriors. So God led them through the wilderness of the Read Sea.

Moses took the bones of Joseph from Egypt. Joseph had made his brothers and their families promise that they would do this.

The Exodus took God's people from their homes in Goshen, at a place called Rameses, to a place called Succoth. From there they went to Etham, which was at the edge of the wilderness.

God sent a beautiful pillar of cloud to guide the Israelites during the day. At night he led them with a pillar of fire. That made it possible for the people to travel by day or night. The pillar of cloud was never out of sight during the day, and the pillar of fire was never out of sight during the night time hours. God was showing the Israelites that He himself would guide them to the place where they were going.



CROSSING THE RED SEA Exodus 14

The Lord told Moses to lead His people along the seashore. Pharaoh would think they were trapped between the desert and the sea. Then he would come after the Israelites.

So the Israelites camped along the seashore. Pharaoh heard about it. He also heard that the Israelites would not be coming back to Egypt. Pharaoh and his officers said, "Why did we let all these slaves go free? Lets go after them." Pharaoh chose 600 of his best chariot drivers. He and the high officials of Egypt led them on the chase and soon approached the Israelites. When the Israelites saw the chariots, they were terrified. "Why did you bring us out here to die?" they complained to Moses. "We told you to leave us alone. It would be better to be slaves in Egypt than to die out here."

"Don't be afraid," Moses said. "Watch what the Lord will do for you."

The angel of the Lord moved the pillar of cloud between the Egyptians and the Israelites. On the Egyptian side it was dark that night, so the Egyptians could not find the Israelites. On the Israelite side it was light because the cloud turned to fire.

"Hold your rod out over the sea," the Lord said. When Moses stretched out his rod, the Lord opened a path through the sea, with walls of water on each side. A strong east wind dried the path. So the Israelites walked safely across the sea between the walls of water.

The Egyptians followed in their chariots. But their chariot wheels began to come off, and the chariots scraped along on the ground. "Let's get away from here," the Egyptians said. "The Lord is fighting for the Israelites and against us."

When the Israelites were on the other side, the Lord told Moses to hold his rod out over the sea again. The sea roared back over the Egyptians, and they all drowned. Now the Israelites knew that the Lord was with them. Moses and all the other people began to sing a song of praise to the Lord.

Let's Review:

BITTER WATER AT MARAH Exodus 15:22-27

At last, the Israelites were safe from the Egyptians. They were on the other side of the sea. Pharaoh's army and chariots were on the bottom of the sea. And it was now time to move on. Moses led them into the Shur Desert.

For three days the Israelites walked across the desert. But there was no water. Everyone was very thirsty. At last, when they came to Marah, there was water. But the water was bitter so they could not drink it. Once more the people turned against Moses. "We'll die of thirst out here!" they whined.

So, Moses prayed. Then the Lord showed Moses a branch from a tree. Moses threw the branch into the water. That made the water sweet. Then the people could drink it.


There at Marah the Lord gave orders to the Israelites. "You must listen to me and obey me," He told them. "You must do what is right. If you do these things, I will keep you from getting the diseases the Egyptians had. I am the Lord. I will heal you.

The next stop on the journey was Elim. This was a wonderful oasis with 12 springs flowing with good water. There were 70 palm trees at Elim too. So, the Israelites set up camp there beside the springs.

GOD SENDS MANNA AND QUAIL Exodus 16

The Israelites left Elim and headed toward Mount Sinai. There in the wilderness the people complained about Moses and Aaron. "We had plenty to eat in Egypt," they said. "Here we are starving! You have brought us out here to die!"

The Lord heard these complaints. "I will rain food from heaven," He told Moses. "But you must warn the people to obey me. Each day the people can gather the food they need for that day."

Moses and Aaron said to the people, "You are not complaining about us. You are complaining about the Lord. But He will give you food." That evening swarms of quail flew down.

In the morning, when the dew left, there were thin, white flakes on the ground that tasted like honey bread. "Gather about two quarts for each person," Moses said. There was just enough for everyone before it melted in the sun. This food was called manna.

"Don't leave any overnight," Moses warned. But some people did. Their food rotted and smelled. Moses told the people to gather twice as much on the sixth day. "The seventh day is the Sabbath, a holy day of rest," Moses said. The extra food gathered on the sixth day did not rot.

The Israelites ate manna for 40 years, until they came to the Promised Land. There God gave them other food to eat.

WATER FROM A ROCK Exodus 17:1 - 7

It was time for the Israelites to move on. God gave them the marching orders.

The next stop was a place called Rephidim. But when the people got there, they found it had no water. So they began to whine again. "Give us water!" they complained.

"Are you testing God again?" Moses demanded.

But the people kept on whining and complaining. "Why did you take us away from Egypt?" they grumbled. "Why did you bring us here with our children and cattle? We are all going to die!"

While the people whined, Moses prayed. That was the way it often happened. "What shall I do?" Moses begged. "These people are ready to kill me."

"Take the elders of Israel with you to Mount Sinai," the Lord said. "I will show you a rock there. Strike it with your rod. Water will come gushing out. There will be plenty of water for everyone."

Moses obeyed the Lord. Things happened the way the Lord said. When Moses struck the rock, water poured out from it.

Moses named the place Massah, which means "the place of testing." He also called it Meribah, which means "the place of arguing."

That is because the Israelite people argued with Moses there. And they tested the Lord by asking if He would take care of them or not.



AARON AND HUR HELP MOSES Exodus 17:8 - 16

After the Israelites left Egypt and went into the wilderness, their only problems at first were finding food and water. But now they had a bigger problem. The warriors of Amalek had come to fight them. So Moses appointed Joshua to be the army leader. Joshua had to call together the Israelite men of fighting age. He had to show them how to become warriors.

"I will stand at the top of the hill tomorrow," Moses said. "I will hold God's rod in my hand." So while Joshua led the warriors into battle, Moses held the rod of God out toward the fighting men. As long as he held out the rod, the Israelites won. But when his arms grew tired and he put the rod down, the warriors of Amalek won.

Moses was too tired to keep holding out his arms. Aaron and Hur had come up the hill with him. When they saw that Moses was tired, they rolled a rock over to him so he could sit on it. Then they stood on each side of Moses, holding up his arms until sunset. That's how Joshua and his warriors won the battle over the warriors of Amalek.







GOD'S TALKS WITH MOSES ON A MOUNTAIN Exodus 19:1-25

The Israelites arrived in the region of Mount Sinai exactly two months after leaving Egypt. They set up camp at the bottom of the mountain. Then Moses climbed up the mountain to talk with God.

"Remind the people of what I have done for them," God said. "Tell them they will be my special people if they obey me. They will be a holy nation." When Moses came down from the mountain, he called the leaders together. He told them what God had said to him.

"We will do everything God asks," the leaders said. So Moses told the Lord what the leaders had said.

"I will come to you as a thick cloud," God told Moses. "The people will hear me. They will trust you then. Have them wash and be clean. I will come the day after tomorrow. Set boundaries so that the people will not come too close to me. If they do, they will die."

So Moses passed these instructions on to the people. On the appointed day, there was a terrible storm with thunder and lightning. A great cloud came down upon the mountain. Then there was a mighty blast like the sound of a trumpet made from a ram's horn. Moses led the people to the bottom of the mountain. There they could hear God but could not see Him.

Moses spoke. God replied in a voice like thunder.


God called Moses to the top of the mountain for more instructions.



THE TEN COMMANDMENTS Exodus 20:1-21

God reminded the Israelite people that He was God. He was the one who had freed them from slavery in Egypt. Then He gave these special laws or commandments to the people through Moses:

- 1. "You shall have no other gods before Me.
- 2. "You shall not make for yourself a carved image—any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth.
- 3. "You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.
- 4. "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord your God.
- 5. "Honor your father and your mother
- 6. "You shall not murder.
- 7. "You shall not commit adultery.
- 8. "You shall not steal.
- 9. "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 10. "You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, nor his male servant, nor his female servant, nor his ox, nor his donkey, nor anything that is your neighbor's."


The people witnessed the thundering, the lightning flashes, the sound of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking; and when the people saw it, they trembled and stood afar off. Then they said to Moses, "You speak with us, and we will hear; but let not God speak with us, lest we die."

And Moses said to the people, "Do not fear; for God has come to test you, and that His fear may be before you, so that you may not sin." So the people stood afar off, but Moses drew near the thick darkness where God was.


